3. Why is the regulation being rescinded?

Please be specific (ORC change, request of stakeholders, etc.)

1. The Board is going through an overhaul of its rules. Because the board is structured in four separate sections for governance purposes (occupational therapy (OT), physical therapy (PT), athletic trainers (AT), orthotics, prosthetics, and pedorthics (OPP)), over time duplicative rules were developed. Most of these rules are nearly identical in order to promote uniform processes for efficiency purposes. The Board has decided to combine these rules which are often repeated four times. This will result in a very large reduction in rules, going from 169 total rules to 86.
2. Some of these rules are also up for five-year rule review and are being rescinded and renumbered as a result.

4. Please describe in general terms the adverse impacts to business, including currently impacted industries, in the existing rule(s).

The Ohio Revised Code requires occupational therapists, occupational therapy assistants, physical therapists, physical therapist assistants, athletic trainers, orthotists, prosthetists, and pedorthists to be licensed. There are educational and examination requirements for each

profession to meet the minimum qualifications, and corresponding costs to that effort. Cost for an initial license is \$100, plus the cost of the FBI/BCI background check. There are costs to obtain continuing education to renew the license. All of these costs impact the workforce for potential employers providing these healthcare services.

Yes. New rules will replace the rescinded ones.

No major regulatory process changes are contemplated with these rescissions and overall rule rewrite.
